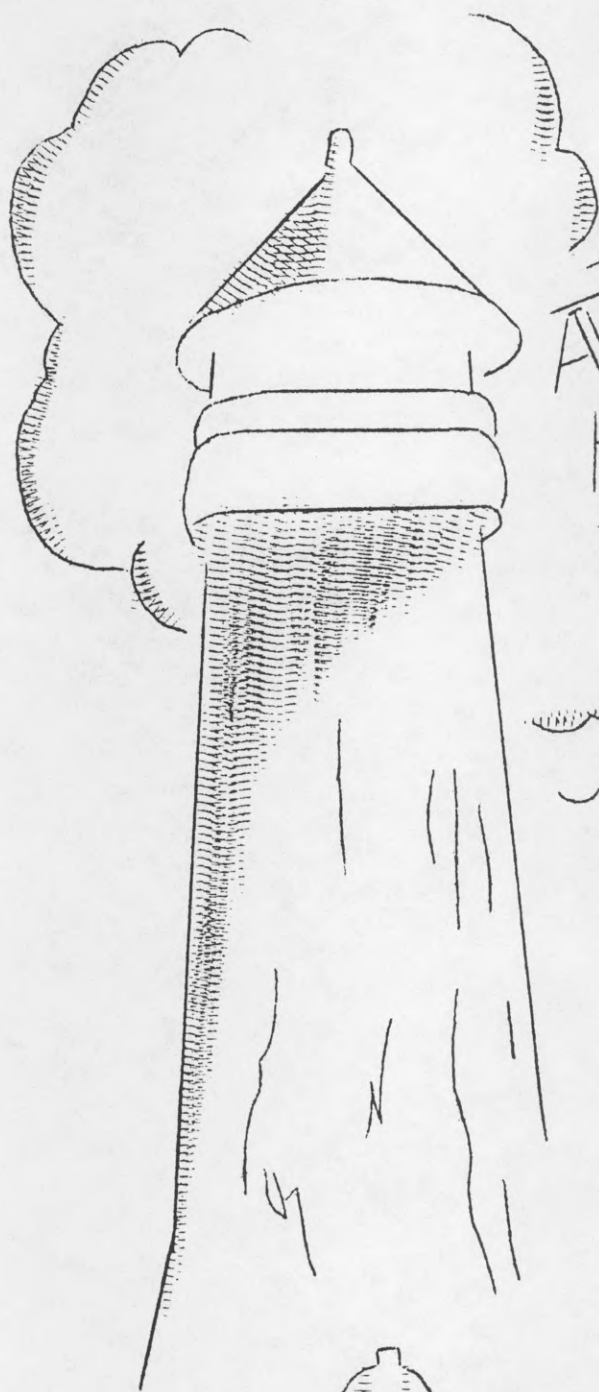
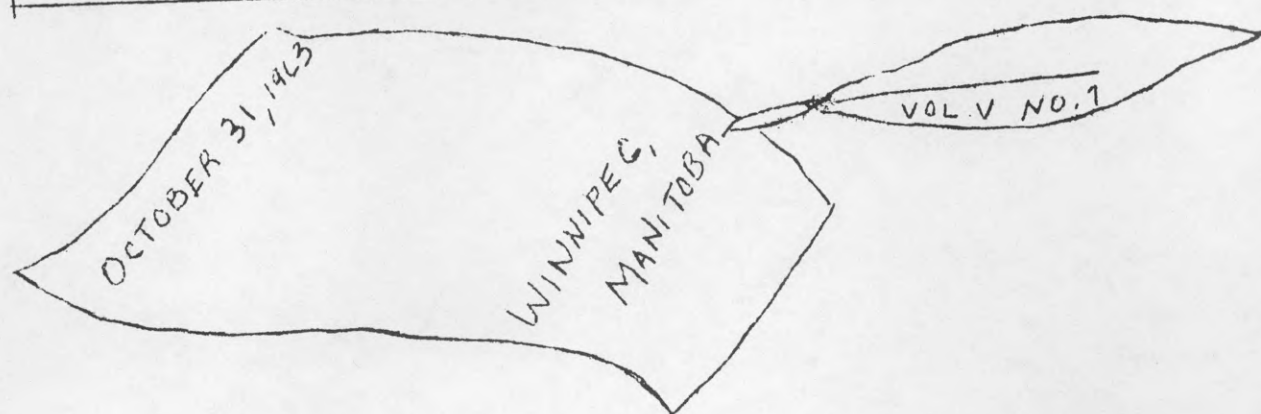
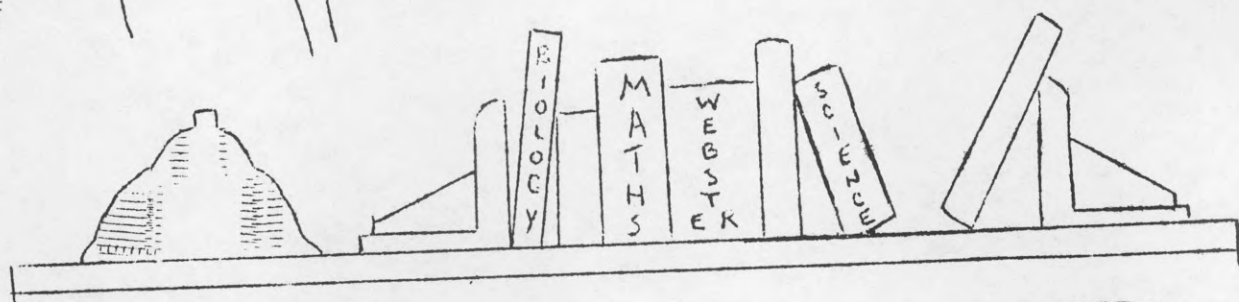
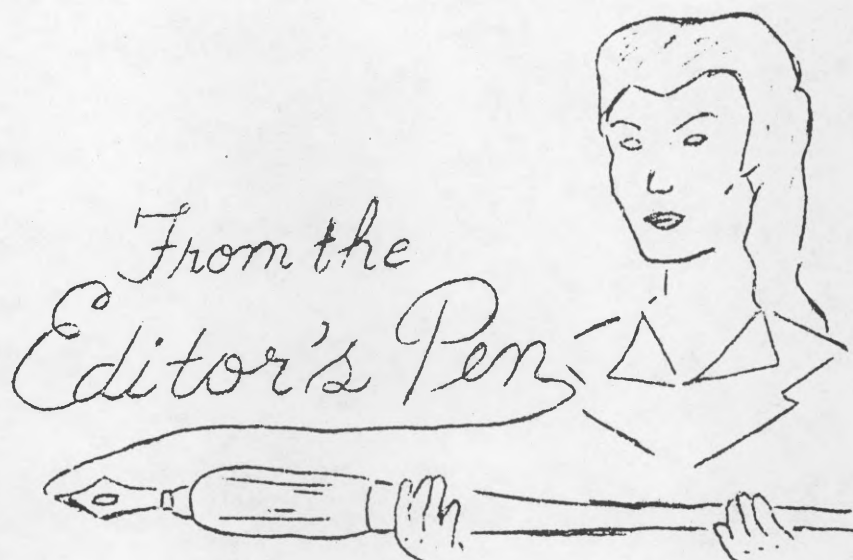




ASSINIBOIA HIGHLIGHTS

On September 3, 1963, after the long, hot summer holidays, the Assiniboia Residential School officially opened and over one hundred and fifteen determined boys and girls rushed in to put in ten months of hard work.

Immediately after settling down to the school routine, a Student Council was formed by the boys' supervisors, Mr. Cardinal and Mr. Marchildon. Their aim is to give the boys more responsibility and to have to organize themselves better. The Grade Nine and Ten were divided into six teams with a leader for each team. The Grade XI and XII were left as one group with their leader. Since then, we have had various experiences and activities. I am sure you are anxious to hear about them.

Sept. 20 - The Assiniboia High School football team had its long and vigorous training rewarded as they downed the Kelvin High School 13-6 in an exhibition game.

Sept. 21 - With bruises obtained in the previous game, the team went on to defeat the Bosco team by an identical score of 13-6. The Bosco team consisted mainly of former Assiniboia stars.

- Sept. 26 - The students had the afternoon off for the annual picnic at the Assiniboia Park where we had organized games after a tasty dinner of saucy brown beans, fruit, doughnuts, and ice cream.
- Sept. 28 - The well-organized team of Assiniboia had its first taste of defeat as the Stonewall team managed a converted touchdown in the dying minutes of the game, making the score 13-12.
- Sept. 29 - The boys went to the Winnipeg Stadium to watch the Regina Rams get beat by the St. James Rods.
- October 1 - Aided by ten husky-voiced cheerleaders, the school team raided the town of Warren and literally ran the defenders to the ground as they upset the Collegiate team by a score of 20-0.
- October 5 - After making a collection for the trip, the boys hopped on a bus and headed for Teulon where they cheered their team on to a win over the Teulon Collegiate. The score was 19-13.
In the meantime, the girls, to make the day seem shorter, went to see "The Longest Day" at the Gaiety Theatre.
- October 6 - The M. A. M. I. had its first meeting.
- October 8 - Again, the unfortunate Warren team feel victims to the merciless Assiniboians as Assiniboia ran over Warren by a score of 22-1.
- October 9-15 - The Indian Schools Teachers' Convention was held here and, as a result, the students has an extra long weekend. The boys went for a two-day camping trip at Patricia Beach. And, the girls were not to be ignored. They also went for a camping trip to Camp Morden for five days.
- October 17 - Teulon took advantage of the long layoff during which the team had no practice, and stomped the out-of-shape Braves by a score of 26-13.
- October 18 - An Oratorical Contest was held in which ten students participated--two from each classroom. The judges were Rev. Fr. Alarie and Rev. Fr. Aubry, both from the Juniorate. The winners were Audrey McPherson, Grade XII, and Cecilia York, Grade X. These two will represent the school at the Manitoba Trustees' Association Oratorical contest with the contestants of the other schools of the Division. Best of luck to them!

October 20 - The M. A. M. I. meeting was cancelled in order to have Mr. Isaac Beaulieu talk to the students about some problems the Indians have to face. We all found the evening to be very interesting. Thanks to Mr. Beaulieu.

October 22 - The school team visited Stonewall intending to have their revenge. However, the teams clashed to an 8-8 tie.

October 23-25 - The Rev. Fr. J. Morin preached a two-day retreat to the students.

October 24 - All the generous pupils of 18 years of age and over went to the Red Cross Centre to donate blood.

October 26 - The Interlake 9-Man Football League saw third-place Assinibois High School crushed by Stonewall by a score of 25-13.

October 27 - The proudest moment of the Assiniboia School took place on October 27, 1963. Two of the former students graduated with honours--a young gentleman and a young lady.

Martin Beardy, who is presently taking a two-year course in Civil Technology at the Manitoba Institute of Technology, saw his days as a high school student come to an end. The young lady was Miss Lorna Nanowin from Matneson Island who, practically, made Assiniboia her home. Martin Beardy hails from Sandy Lake, Ontario. Among the distinguished guests, there were Rev. Fr. Provincial, Rev. Fr. Alarie who was a favorite among our teachers last year and who is presently teacher at the Juniorate College, Rev. Fr. Chaput, Principal of the Sandy Bay Indian School; Rev. Fr. Lemire from McIntosh, Ontario; Rev. Fr. Laviolette, the Reverend Sisters from St. Boniface; the Reverend Sisters of the Sandy Bay Indian School with their choir; Mr. and Mrs. E. Dagget; (Mr. Dagget is the Superintendant of the Clandeboyne Agency.) Mr. J. Slobodzian, the Regional Inspector of the Indian Schools; Mr. Isaac Beaulieu, who replaced the guest speaker. The former graduates of the Assiniboia School were also present. Among these were Oliver Nelson, Joe Guy Wood, Louie Cheesaquay, and Elizabeth Menow.

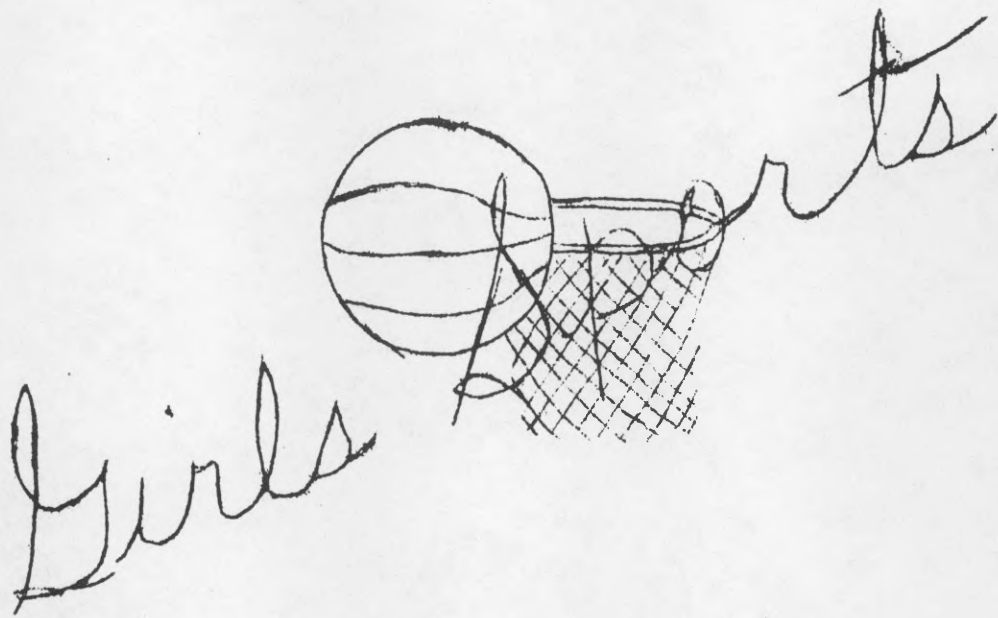

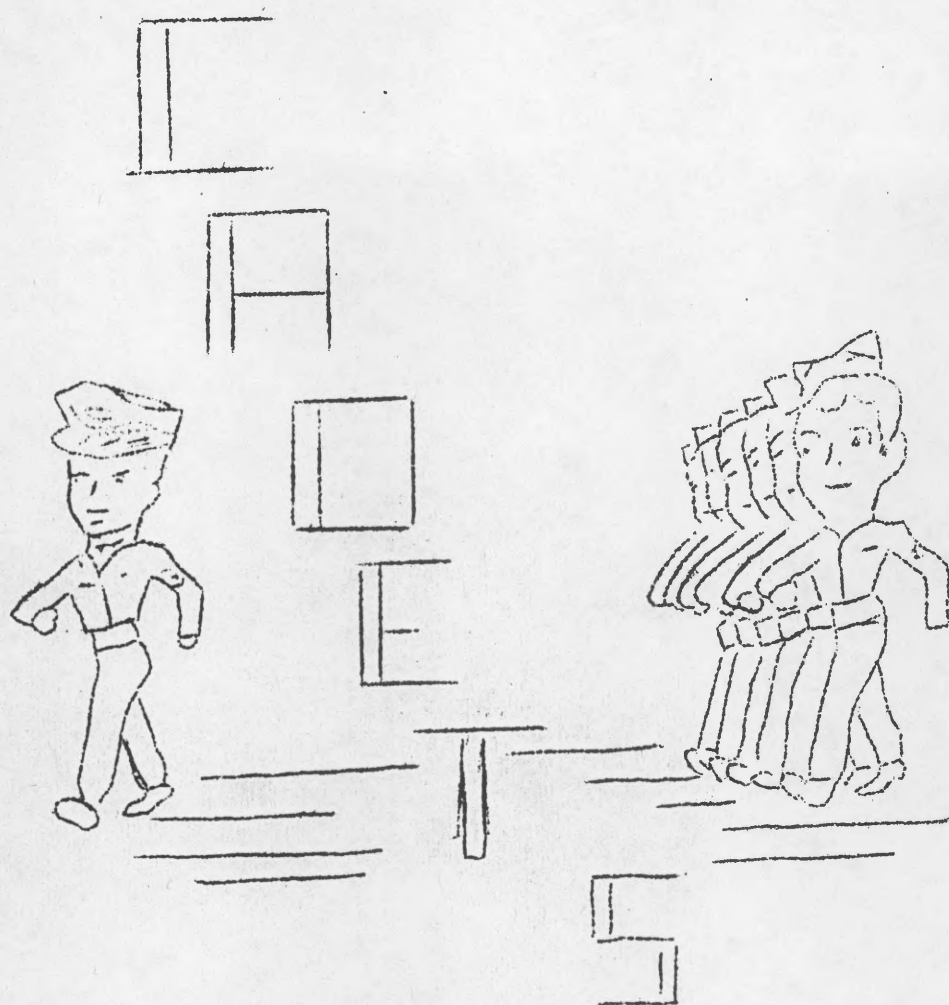
