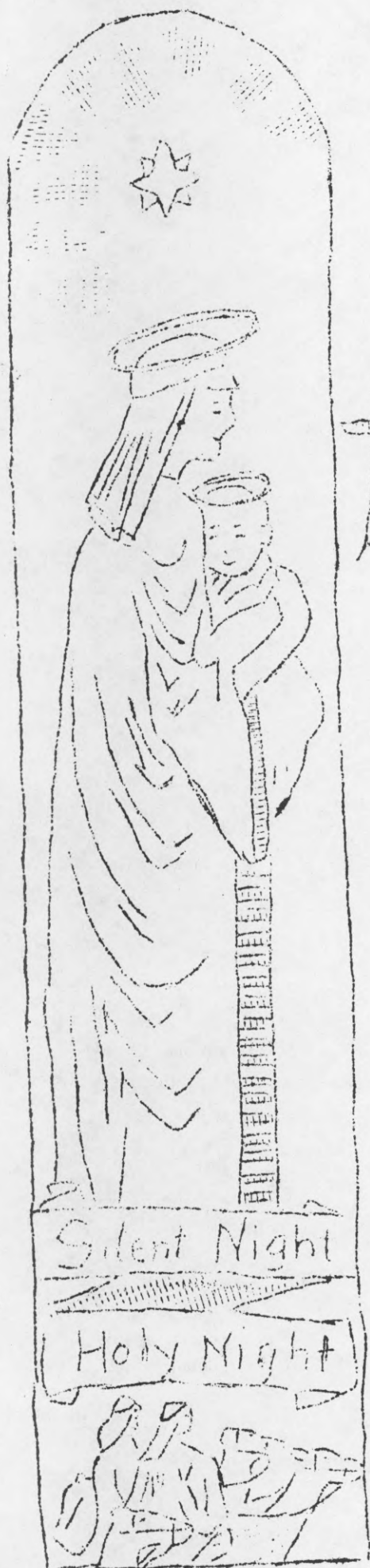

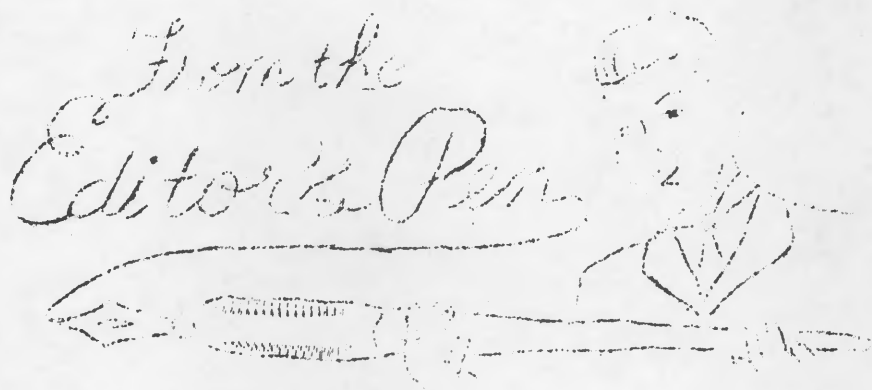

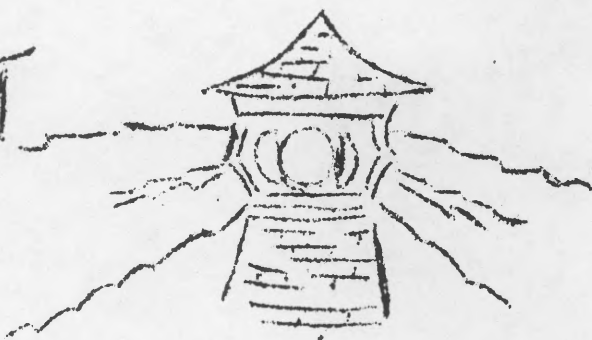
A school paper like this one is made to give parents an idea of the students activities. To all the parents, we wish to convey an idea of how we, students, try to make use of the opportunities given to us.

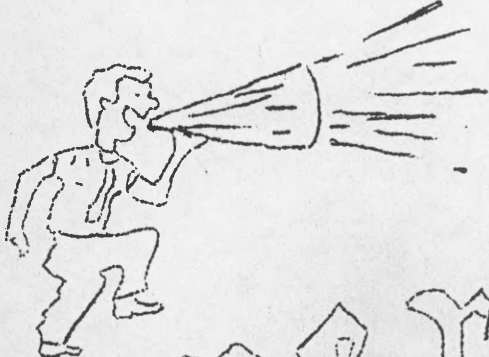

General News

Dear Parents and Friends,

Here I am to tell you about the students and what they do.

September 1, 1964 The doors of Assiniboia School opened again for another ten months of work. The "old timers" are numerous and warmly greet one another, they also see new faces whom they get acquainted with.

September 7, 1964 As it is Labor Day we spent the greater part of our school holiday at the Assiniboine Park where we had lunch, played organized games, enjoyed ourselves very much.

September 11, 1964 The student body with the school staff of Assiniboia held their first meeting in the cafeteria. Rev. Father L. Leroux O.M.I., our Senior teacher introduced each member of the staff to the students. He gave us the school regulations and he also announced that a Student Council was to be organized this year.

September 13, 1964 Another meeting was held in the cafeteria at 7:30 P.M. Because the grade nine students were not used to the school, grades ten, eleven and twelve were the only ones eligible for the Executive of the Student Council. Rev. Father L. Leroux explained how the Council was going to work and how to prepare the elections.

September 20, 1964 The students held their elections for the Executive of the Student Council. Billy Flett was elected president; Audrey McPherson, first vice-president and at the same time president of the M.A.M.I. ; Leonard McKay second vice-president and President of Activities. Other members to be in charge of the M.A.M.I. of the social, work, and library committees were also elected.

September 23, 1964 The candidates of the Student Council gave their speeches in which some outlined their platform.

September 27, 1964 By way of welcoming the newcomers we had organized an "Initiation Party" for them. The "old timers" dressed them up in all kinds of costumes. During the evening the seniors asked each pupil to perform in front of the whole staff.

September 28, 1964 The school's football team played against Stonewall and lost by a score of 25 to 7.

October 1-2, 1964 The Teachers' Convention was held at the Royal Alexandra Hotel. During the teachers' absence we had a two-day retreat preached by Rev. Father G. Fetsch O.M.I.

October 3, 1964 Our boys trampled over Warren with a score of 26 to 1.

October 10, 1964 Assiniboia's football team was beaten by Taulon 3 to 7.

October 10-12, 1964 We had a long week-end because of Thanksgiving Day. Some went home and those who stayed enjoyed themselves as much as they could; the girls at Camp Morton and the boys travelled to Seekaywee.

October 14, 1964 Assiniboia again trampled over Warren with a score of 27 to 3.

October 17, 1964 The football team defeated Taulon 30 to 6.

October 20, 1964 Our boys lost again to Stonewall 20 to 1.

October 24, 1964 Assiniboia skunked Warren 32 to 0.

October 31, 1964 Assiniboia captured the Interlake Football League Championship. And they came home with the Interlake Division High School Football Trophy. They defeated Stonewall 26 to 18.

November 1, 1964 The Social Committee again organized a fun-filled evening for our Halloween Party. Everyone was in formal dress. This year admission had to be paid in order to help out Rev. Father A. Carriere O.M.I., in his mission. We danced, played games, and the evening was topped off with a lunch which was very delicious.

November 11, 1964 Since it is Remembrance Day we had only half a day of school. Because of the bad weather we stayed in the house for an exciting afternoon organized by the social committee.

November 18, 1964 The grades eleven and twelve students went to the Gaiety Theatre to see the movie "Macbeth" which is a play in the grade eleven English Course.

STUDENT COUNCIL NEWS



Dear Readers, Parents, and Friends;

Here we are again to carry on with the "Assiniboia Highlights" for the school year of 1964-1965. As this is the first edition of the school paper, I welcome you all to read the news and happenings which occur in Assiniboia High School.

For the first time in the history of Assiniboia Residential High School, a student council is formed.

On September 8, our Senior Teacher, Rev. Father Leroux explained to the students, the outline and general idea of its constitution. Many of the students, who were here the previous year, may remember that Father Leroux had talked about it and many were looking forward to it.

From September 13 to the 16 nominations were opened up. On the 16 nominations were closed. In the interval the student body waited in suspense for the outcome of their doings. Finally came the simple sheet of paper for which everyone was waiting rather impatiently, yet eagerly; the list of nominees. After this had been put up, the students launched into political rallies such as Assiniboia had never yet seen. The group split up into two major parties rallying under the two nominees for president. Audrey McPherson of Fort Frances, Ontario led the group called SLAVD and Billy Flett of St. Theresa Point, Manitoba led the group known as the C-WEB-BETCH PARTY. The names chosen were derived from the initials of the first names of nominees who had joined the party. A great many posters and slogans were

put up on the bulletin boards, on doors, and mainly plastered on all four walls of the dining room. With great enthusiasm the students put up posters wherever they could find place, sometimes taking down the posters of the opposing party to put up one of their own in its place. The nominees in the meantime, gave speeches whenever possible, hoping to gain many supporters.

On September 20, 1964 came the most important historical event in Assiniboia's history. The minor occurrences of the afternoon took place during the half-time period of an exciting football game between the Bosco club and the school team, when a parade with all the fanfare of drums and standards bearing the names of the two parties was held. The same evening everyone assembled in our famous dining room (which, as you all know we use from a cafeteria to a dance hall) for the elections. Before starting the votes, we stripped the walls of its posters and the nominees were allowed to make a short speech, as the last chance to gain more support. After these speeches everyone settled down quietly and the votes began. Waiting eagerly for the results, the students became almost a mob when a cheer broke out and the announcement was given. Mr. Billy Flett had just become the first President of the first Student Council of Assiniboia. The other votes followed and the following students were elected to the various offices.

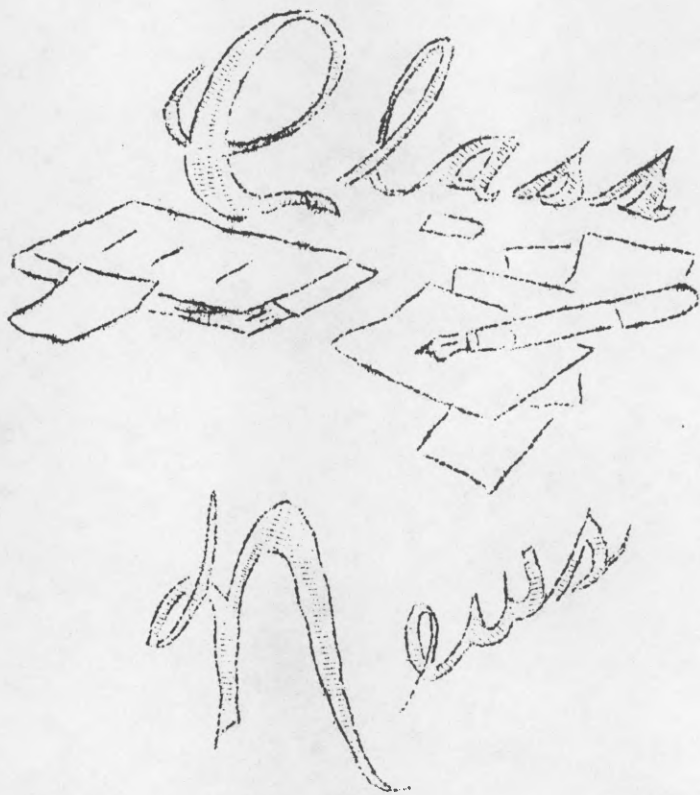

INDIAN-WHITE RELATIONS CAN BE IMPROVED

An address to Friends of the Indians Society, Edmonton,
March 7, 1964
by Clive Linklater

Within the past few years there has been a great increase in matters affecting the Indian people. There have been many accomplishments particularly since the post-war years, the establishment of Indian High Schools, and the granting of greater educational opportunities in other institutions of higher and specialized training; the granting Federal vote; the granting of the Provincial vote and liquor rights in other provinces; the establishment of Community Development Services; the founding of Friendship Centres in urban areas; the provision for leadership training and greater leadership opportunities.

There are some positive efforts to help the Indian people improve their situation in life today. Yet, despite these and other efforts to help the Indian people there seems to be an uneasy feeling that all is not well between Indian and White man. Perhaps, there is even a feeling of mistrust or distrust on the part of the Indian for the White man.

This does not mean, however, there is open hostility between Indian and White man, but is as if the Indians' and Whiteman's hearts do not freely to welcome each other. There is a veil of misunderstanding, a barrier that must be torn asunder if we are to live in harmony.

NO BITTERNESS

There does not exist bitter racial strife between Red and White man. Consequently we are never likely to see an Indian Revolt in Canada. We are more likely to see the Indian people taking a fuller share in Canadian life by a process of evolution and not revolution.

One of the problems that causes misunderstanding is such a simple matter as terminology--the words that are used in describing things. This problem began from the very first time Columbus landed in this hemisphere. For example we are not really Indians at all. We do not come from India.

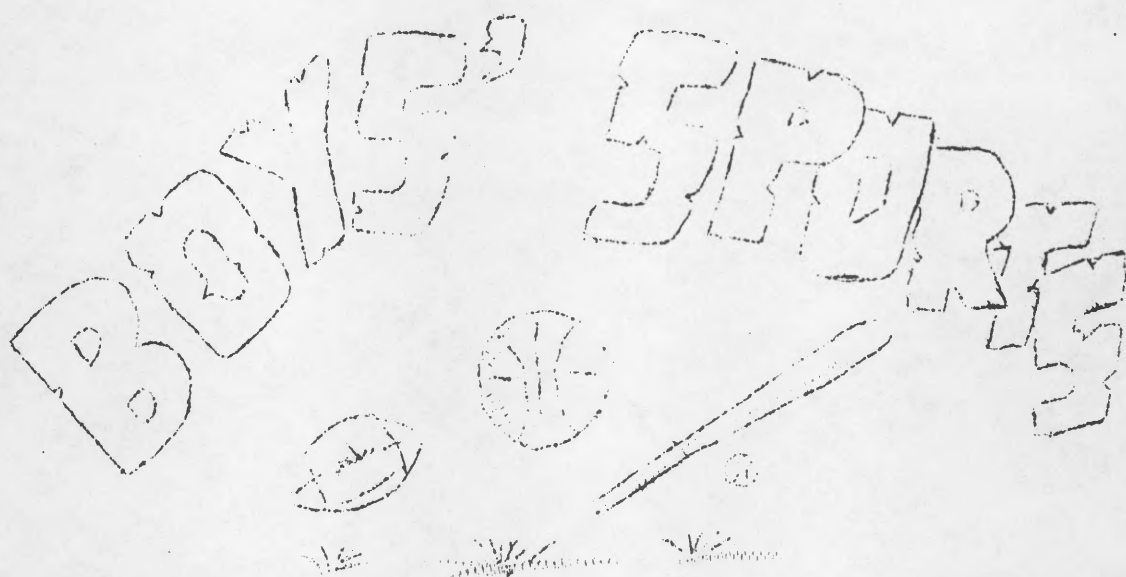

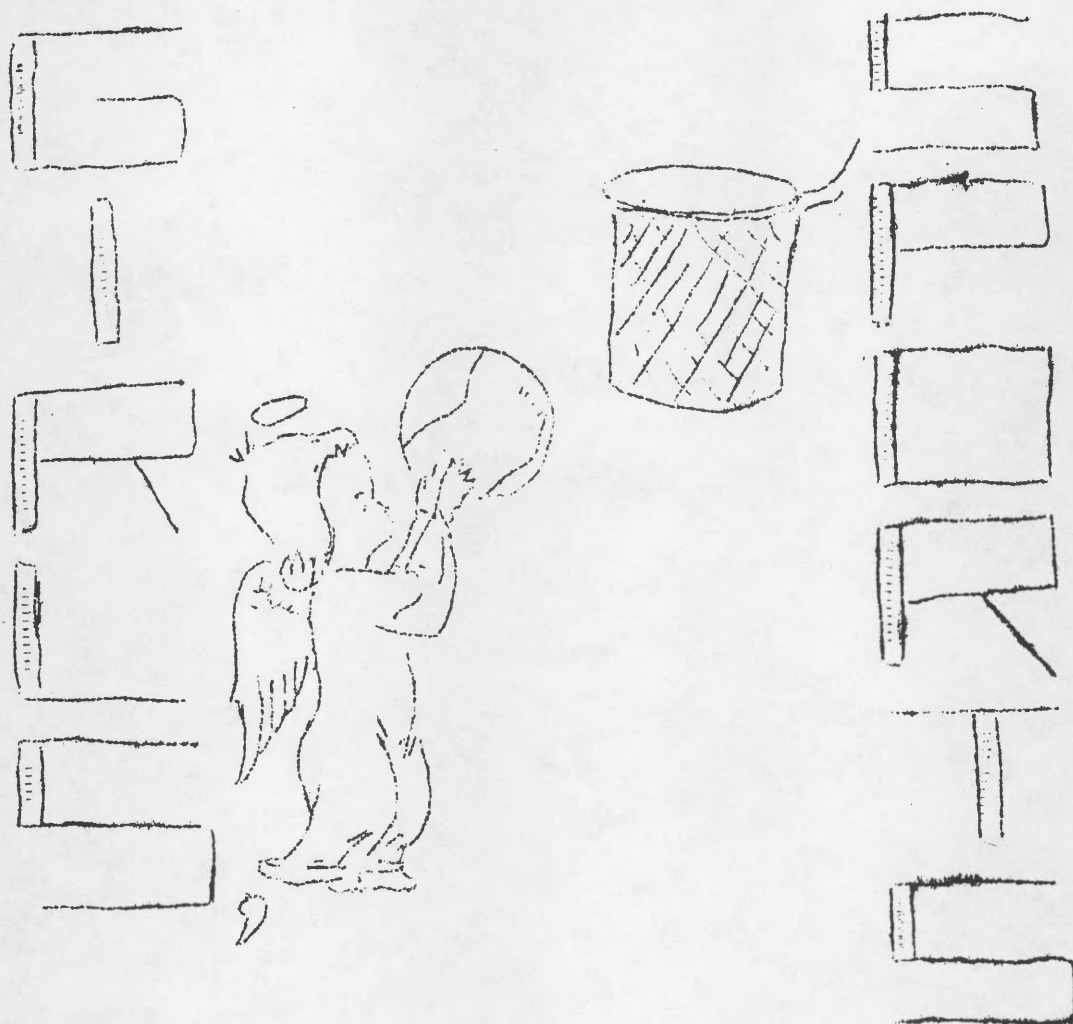
