Dear Parents and Friends,

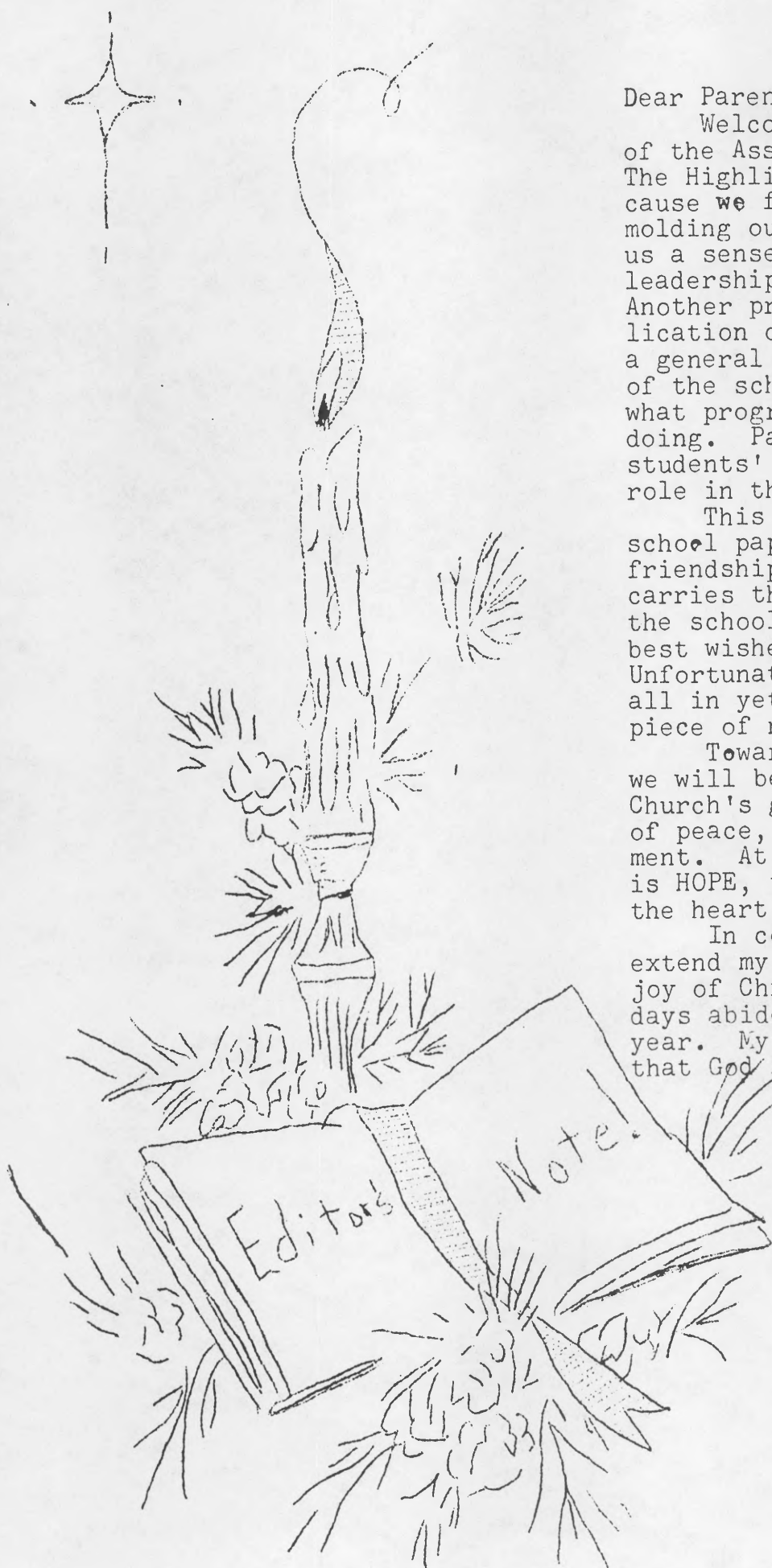

Welcome to our first edition of Assiniboia Highlights. I am here to bring you up to date with the happenings at Assiniboia High.

On September 1, 1965 Assiniboia School reopened for another school year. Approximately 130 students enrolled on the first day. This number increased as the stragglers arrived. This year there is no grade nine just Grades X, XI, and XII.

The staff and students assembled for the first meeting on September 3, 1965. Father Leroux introduced the members of the staff to the students. There is one new member, namely, Mr. M. Tataryn, formerly principal of Pine Falls, now teaching Grade XI and XII Chemistry, and grade X Mathematics and Science.

September 6, 1965. Labor Day to-day but the students did not labor as they had a holiday. A picnic was planned but rain made it an impossibility, however, the pupils enjoyed generous servings of beans, indoors. After the lunch hour, games were played inside the unfinished gymnasium. The day was topped off by a dance.

September 30, 1965 to October 1/65. Our teachers attended the Teachers' Convention and the students had two days off. They took a trip to Norquay Beach and spent the beautiful day over there.

October 8/65. The staff and students attended a play at the Civic Auditorium. The play was entitled "The Dream", which was about the Fathers of Confederation at the time of the Quebec Conference.

General News Cont'd:

October 9, 1965. The boys went out on a two-day camping trip at Patricia Beach on the shores of Lake Winnipeg.

October 23, 1965. The University of Manitoba held "open house" so the students took advantage of this opportunity to visit the University. The Grade 10 boys, later on, attended a career talk on Architecture. The girls also went to listen to a speech on nursing.

October 24, 1965. The grade XII students had their first banquet of the year in which a guest speaker is invited. Mr. Eugene Courchene, Indian Agent of Sandy Bay, was our invited speaker on the occasion. Mr. E. Courchene's talk was centered around the life of students after high school.

October 27, 1965. Miss Mary Kennedy of the Legion of Mary, visited the school. She also talked to the students about the organization and works of the Legion of Mary.

November 1, 1965. The student cards were out on this day. They were sold at 25 cents each.

November 19, 1965. The student council opened a bank account at the National Bank of Canada. The council also bought sport uniforms for the girls.

December 5, 1965. Mr. Isaac Beaulieu was guest speaker at the second banquet held by the grade XII. Mr. Beaulieu spoke on Community Development on the Indian reserves.

The gymnasium and Chapel are nearly completed. The official opening and graduation were originally planned for December 19, but it is now cancelled. The events will likely be held early in 1966.

We hope that you will enjoy reading the Highlights and that you have a "Joyeux Noel" as well as a prosperous 1966.

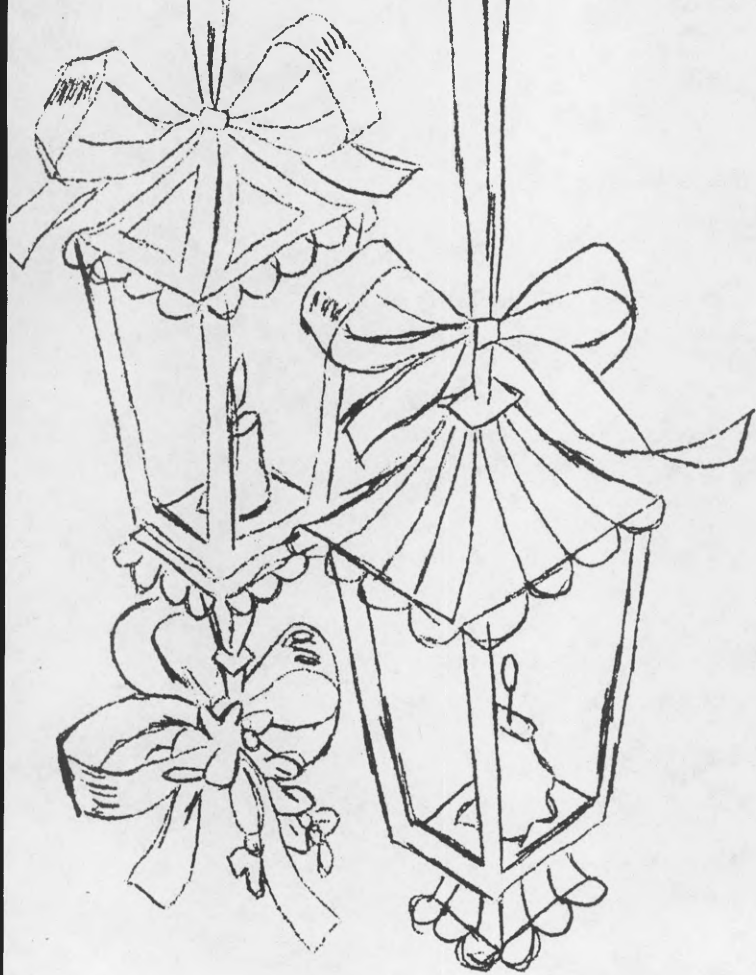
PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS

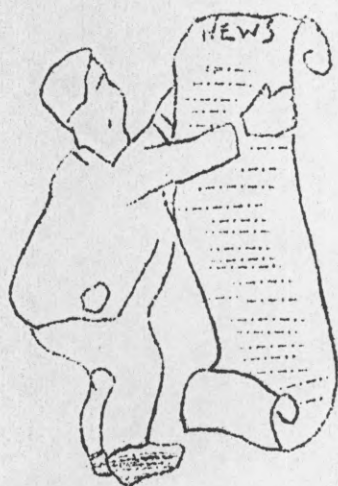
Jesus Is Born

Jesus your King is born, in Excelsis Gloria.

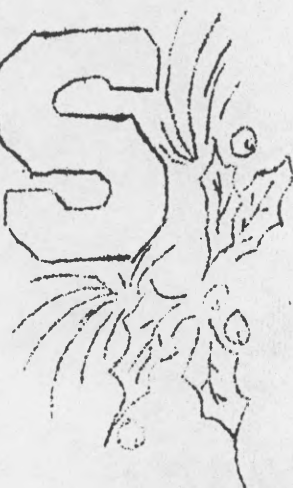
Within a lodge of broken bark,

Dear Readers,

Season's greetings coming to you from Assiniboia grade twelve classroom. On behalf of all the grade twelve students, I welcome you to our little "world" of work and "goings-on".

Our little classroom world consists of twenty-four members, eighteen of whom have complete grade eleven standing. Our class president is a determined young lady, Valerie Mainville of Fort Frances, Ontario. Under her leadership we have had several class meetings and we can depend on her to inform us of the substance of students council meetings.

Our new chemistry teacher, Mr. Tataryn, along with a new chemistry text, has provided last year's students with a new source of enthusiasm and interest. As for the new ones, the beginning of the year brought subjects containing more fully developed information than we had learned in former grades. The laws and basic concepts of Chemistry, for example, are more clearly explained. What may be of interest to you, is that with various methods, we can determine the weight of the smallest particle of matter, the atom, and also that of the electron. We even learn about "the romance of Na plus ions and Cl minus ions which unite in the electrovalent bond of marriage, forming a family of NaCl molecules."

As for Maths, presently we are puzzling over the "compound interest" problems, having completed ratio, progressions, and quadratic equations, etc. However, we have many more formulas to learn and to apply, as they are scattered throughout the text.

Grade XII course consists of five subjects only, Chemistry, Biology, French, Maths, and English. The September tests showed only three failures while in the October ones only one failed. In the December term exams we hope to see everyone about the half-way

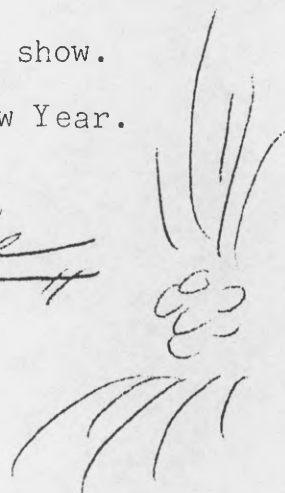

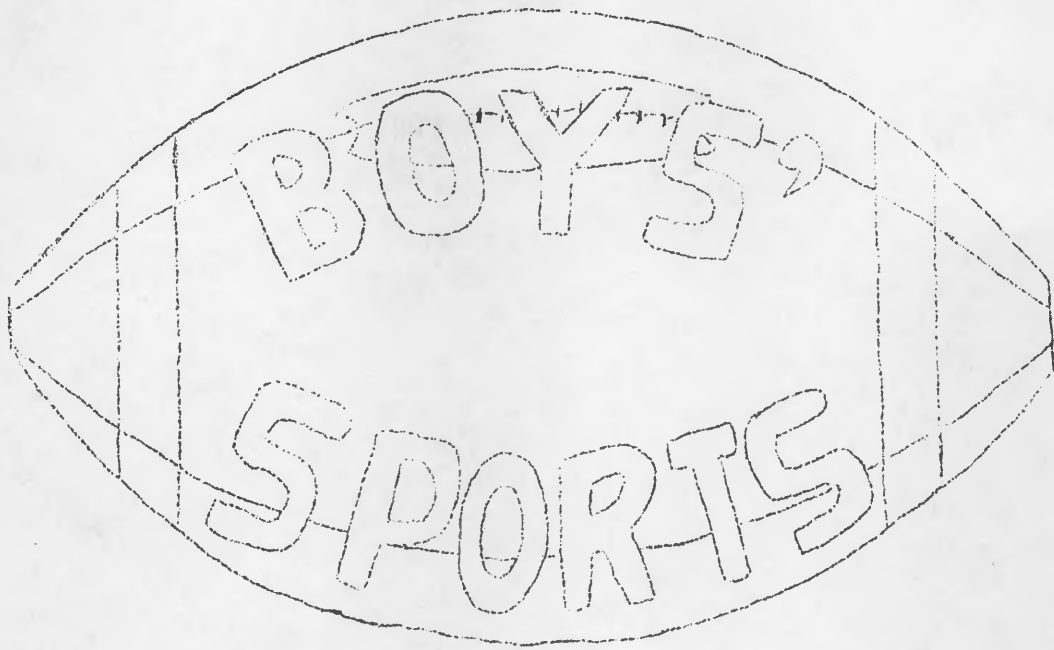

Our football training commenced immediately on the first day of school by physical exercises. The teams were divided according to experience, size, and ability into Senior and Junior Teams. The Seniors combatted against teams like Stonewall and Teulon and made up the Interlake High School Football League. The first game played at Stonewall on September 29 was a crushing defeat for our Assiniboians. The natures of Stonewall stood like a wall of stone when we played offensively. On October 2, Assiniboia whipped Teulon by the score 28 to 7. The great wall of stone was smashed down on October 13 when Assiniboia trampled the big Stonewall team by a score of 33 to 18. 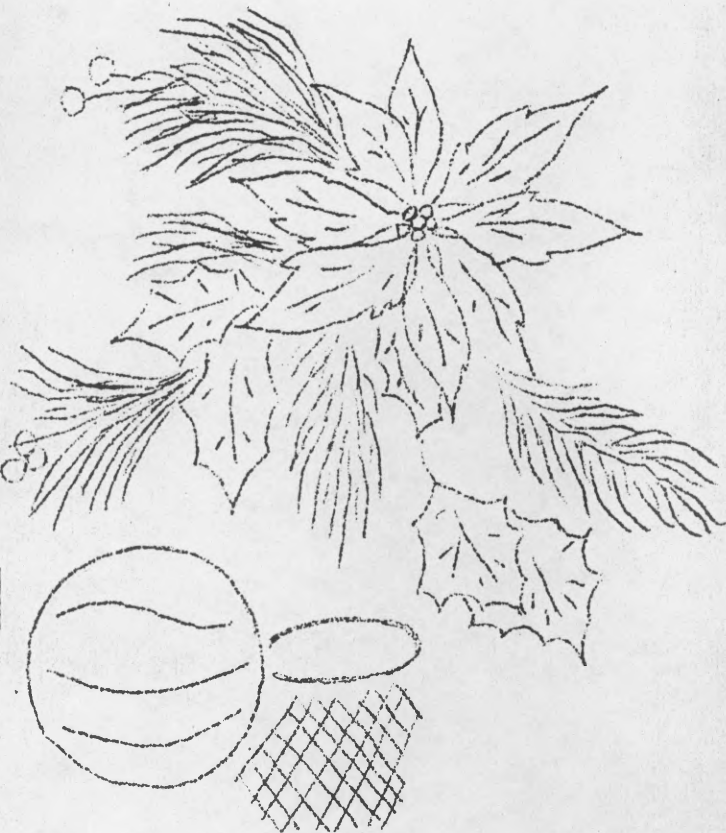
Monster

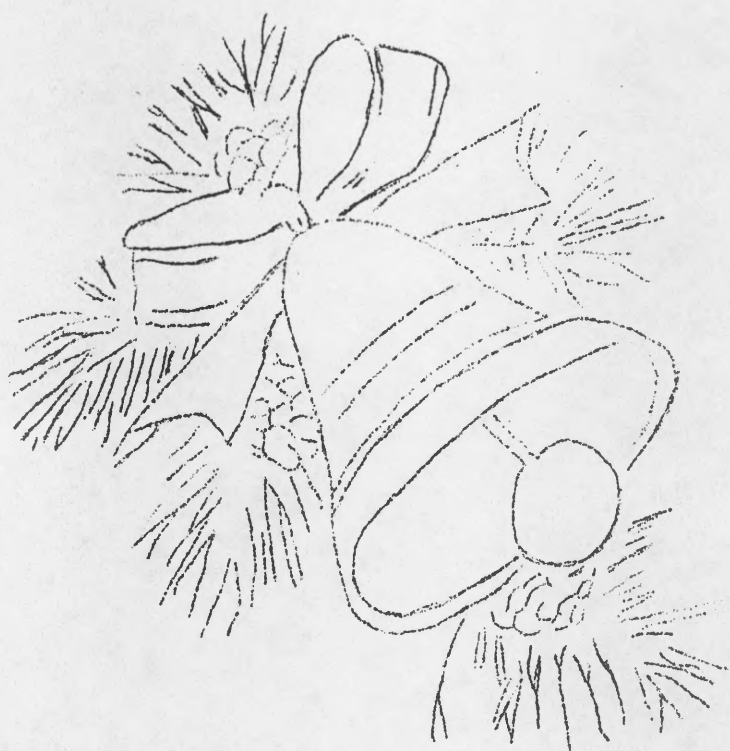
In conclusion to the report of activities of our Student Council I enclose my best regards and my wishes for a very Merry Christmas to you and yours.

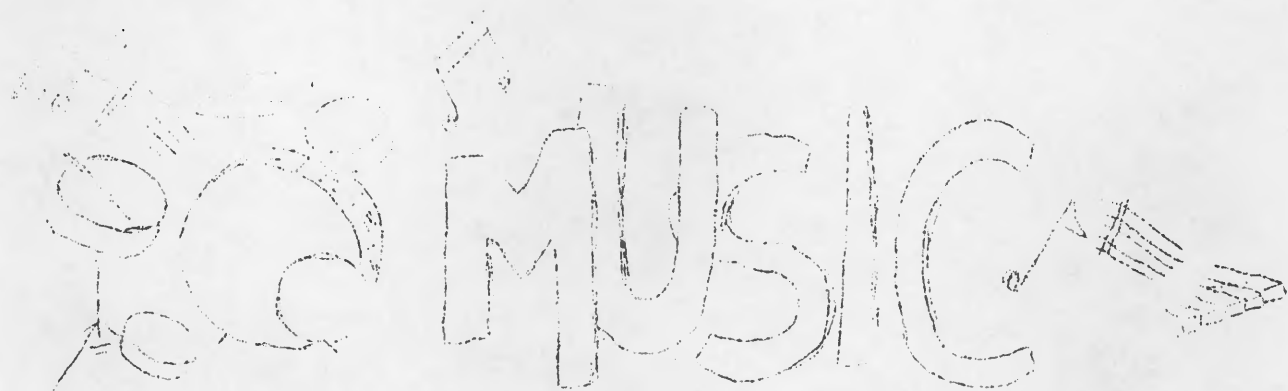

Centennial Tour

As a representative of the Grade XI of our school and of Assiniboia, in general, it was my privilege of being selected as a participant in the 1965 Student Exchange Program, co-sponsored by the Manitoba Centennial Corporation and the National Centennial Commission.

I was assigned to Unit 70, which consisted of twenty-three other students, leaving July 5, 1965, for Calgary, Alberta. The exact time and details concerning the trip were later forwarded to me. It was necessary to fill in a number of forms, to pay a small fee of \$1.00 per student, to cover for Accidental Death and Dismemberment and Blanket Accidental Medical Reimbursement.

We met our escorts, Mr. & Mrs. Witherspoon, the day before our departure, when they had given us each a "Centennial Traveller" bag a present from Ottawa and informed us the departure time set for 10:40 the following morning at the C.P. R. Station.

Upon my arrival at the station, I found the group clustered together, buzzing like bees, while stating their prospects of the trip. The train, however, was two hours late, but finally we departed from Winnipeg at 12:00 heading for sunny Alberta.

The ride was rather long and noisy: what with twenty-four young people as nervous as can be about what lay ahead. The main attraction during the ride was a train derailment near Moose Jaw. Finally after twenty-two or so long hours on the train, we arrived at the Calgary Station around ten o'clock the following morning.

When we got there we saw men, women, and children decked out in complete cowboy ensembles and white hats. The day had already begun for the Calgary folk and everyone was busy awaiting another Stampede day. Almost immediately we were swept away to be introduced over the air, radio CKXL. We were then taken to meet our host families with whom we were to stay for a week. I met the Burluck family, and their daughter and I went off to spend the afternoon at the Calgary Stampede, where we had booked seats to see the Dave Clark Five.

During the week following, there was much rain and hail, which our group of Winnipeg students, seemed to have brought with us. However, we continued our tour in spite of the occasionally unexpected downpours.

We visited Banff for one day, and had an opportunity of riding the gondola lift to the top of Sulphur Mountain. In the town of Banff we visited the Luxton Museum and returned home at five o'clock. Our next day was spent at Happy Valley, a recreational centre a few miles

out of Calgary. There we were able to participate in golf, swimming, riding horses, riding paddleboats, jumping on trampolines, and the like. We then visited Heritage Park on July 9, a park containing an imitation village of the early 1900's, complete with its railway line, blacksmith shop, dentist shop, church, school, Indian village, fort and ranch. From here we visited the beautiful Jubilee Auditorium, the museum, and the Calgary Zoo.

Friday evening, was spent with my hostess at the Stampede. watching the chuckwagon races and its stage show followed by the usual fireworks display.

Saturday was left to our own discretion with no planned tour. Many of us took this opportunity to sleep in. On Sunday we were also free. After having attended Mass, the Burlucks and I spent the afternoon at this club where we went swimming. Afterwards they took me about the University grounds, and we watched the Stampeders practice nearby.

Monday's plans to visit a nearby ranch was drowned with rain. We returned to Happy Valley that evening for a big barbecue with all the host families present. Later in the evening there was a farewell party for all, as it was our last night.

Tuesday was left free again, in order that we would get ready for our return trip. Immediately, after supper we were taken to the station where farewells were already being said. A great majority of the girls were unable to depart as dry-eyed as they wished. As it was, everybody disliked leaving after so short an acquaintance, and yet we were overjoyed at the prospect of returning home. We left Calgary that evening on July 13, at eight o'clock for another long ride back to Manitoba.

This wonderful experience will be unforgettable, and I owe many sincere thanks to Reverend Father Robidoux Principal, and Mr. Ross of the Indian Affairs Branch for having made possible this exciting opportunity for me.

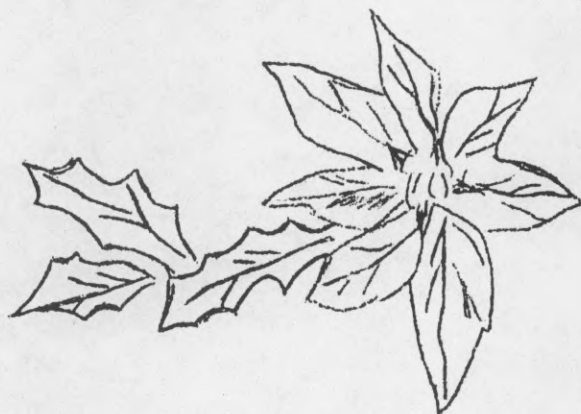
