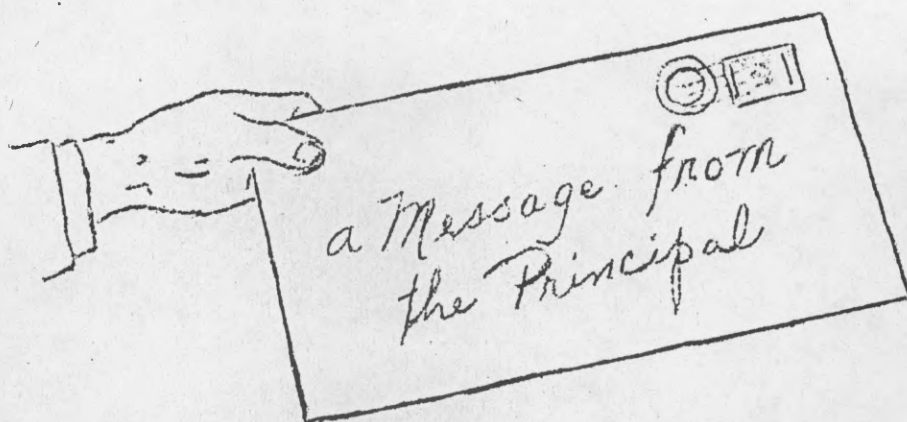

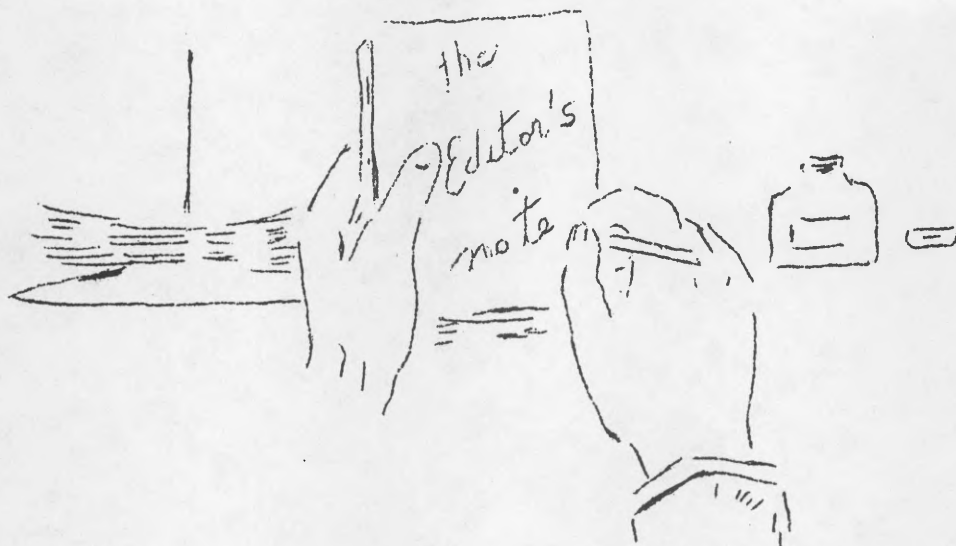
A school must take into account the true nature of the persons, weave together the various factors such as intellect, knowledge, attitudes, will and character so that they all function as a unit.

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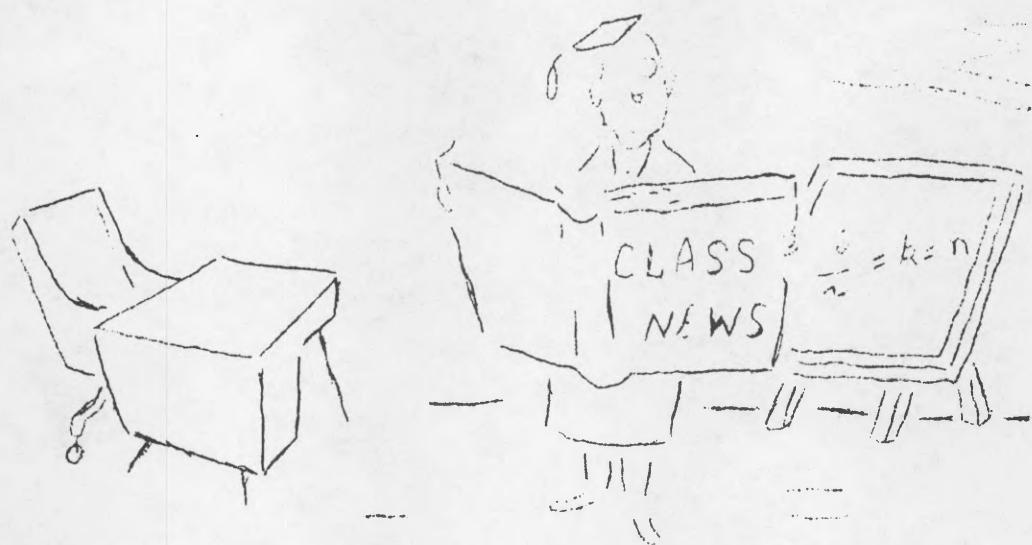

Dear Readers:

Welcome back to the class of Grade XI-B and to the third editor of the Assiniboia Highlights. In this edition we shall endeavour to materialize for you the proceedings of this class since the termination of the year 64. While nothing spectacular has taken place there are other events which might prove of interest to you.

Every Tuesday morning at 10, during the past month of February we have had the opportunity to witness educational T.V. programs comprising the various aspects of Physics. The activity was carried out in the expectation that it would enable us to understand more fully the basic concepts of the material that we were to undergo or had already undergone. As a whole it seemed to have modified some of the difficulties we encounter in that field of science. Presently we are studying the reflection and refraction of light waves and a multiple of conjugal material directly in its line, such as lenses and optical instruments used to verify the behaviour of light waves when striking a medium.

So much said for that now as far as the other academic subjects are concerned we seem to be proceeding along as required. Here you have them in no particular order or sequence.

Mathematics, well everyone is progressing at a rate to suffice. However in the event of difficulties the pace slackens awhile to linger in the same chapter until we grasp fully its mathematical functions as related with the preceding one. Eventually, everyone realizes the simplicity of the complex then, we continue the battle of wits at the original pace. The students, at this stage, are quite obviously feeling that "something" which makes people realize the significance of the challenge that lies before them.

In Literature we have come to the end of the line. This term has carried us far into the study of the great Shakespearean tragedy, "Macbeth," which by all means is not quite as easy as one may be inclined to believe. Its almost intangible nature can perhaps be attributed to the students' unfamiliarity of the Shakespearean language. Needless to say everyone made an effort to excel in that matter. Besides this we have completed all the material specified under Literature: poems, short stories and essays. The majority of these were interesting and it remains to be seen whether or not each will profit by it.

The next in line is English. As it serves in conjunction with its immediately preceding subject there isn't much to say about it, but in its entirety it is not altogether correct. Heading its cause is composition and precis writing, both of which the students are sufficiently adept to pull through with flying colours. Sugar and spice? Not exactly. There happens to be oral compositions under the name of impromptu speeches. Everyone was given the opportunity to present one or two and mind you it could be very embarrassing. Fortunately everyone survived, though the compelling force of diffidence may have resulted in a little show of resistance.

- May 30th Our Farwell Party took place where everyone said their good-byes for the summer, some with broken hearts others with joy!

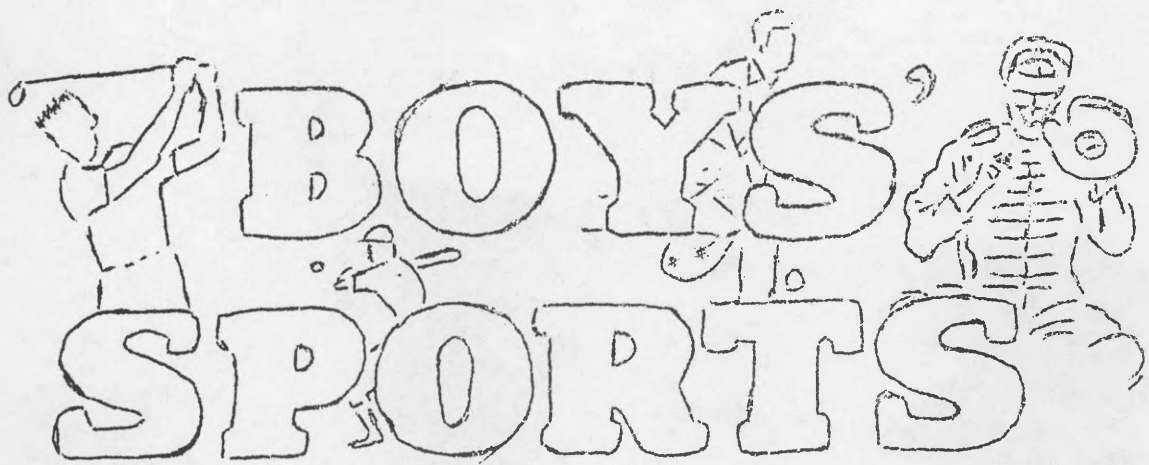

TRUE LEADERSHIP

By recognizing and developing Indian leadership will greater respect and honor be restored to the Indian leaders. By giving the Indian people a full share in determining their own future will confidence and initiative be restored. The Indian people must be fully consulted in any major discussions, planning, and negotiations that take place among the different groups whose actions affect the Indian's lives.

Indians and Whites must learn to accept each other in our own hearts and in our own lives, and in our own homes. We must look for the good in each other and forgive the bad. We must get to know each other, to trust each other, and to respect each other.

The White man must recognize the Indians have done much good for the White man, and the Indian must recognize the White man has done much good for the Indian. The White man must develop an unshakeable belief that what Indians want for themselves is good for them and good for Canada. The Indians must also develop an unshakeable belief that the White man wants to do what is right and best for the Indian people.

With these beliefs and with clear, constant communication we will find acceptable solutions to the common problems facing Indian and White man. We must firmly believe that we can and that we will live together in harmony, in happiness and in brotherhood.

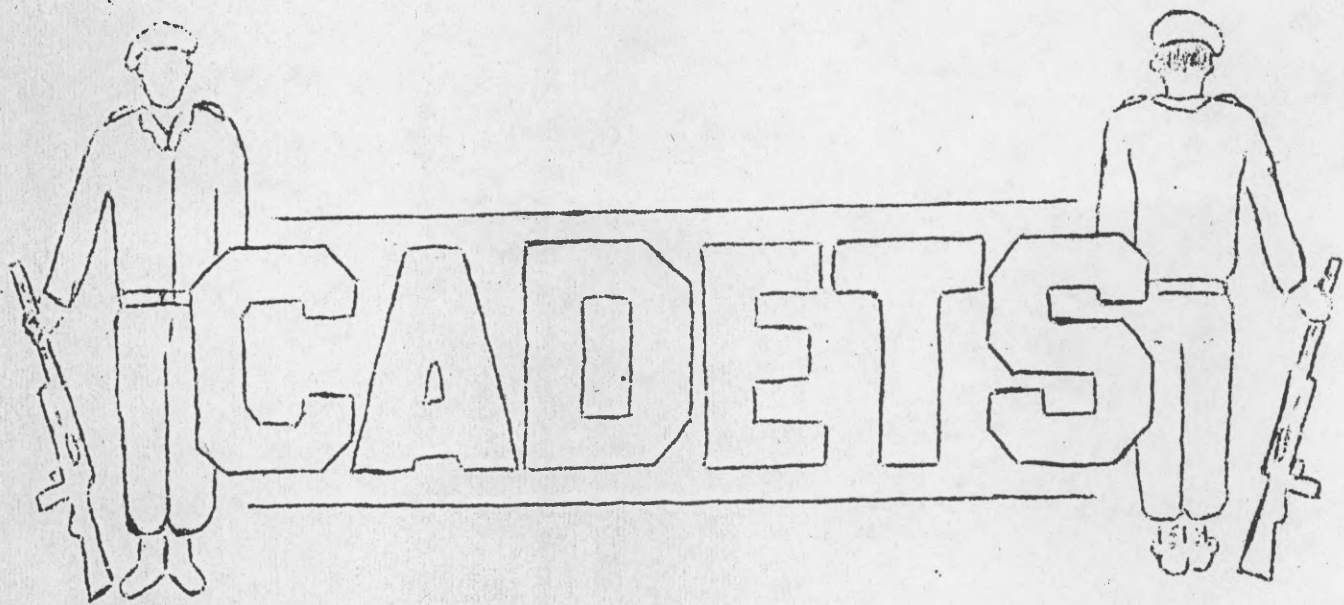
